

AGD President-Elect Testified on Amalgam at FDA Hearing

CHICAGO (September 7, 2006) - Dr. Vincent C. Mayher, DMD, president-elect of the Academy of General Dentistry (AGD), testified yesterday in support of using dental amalgam as a viable option to treat dental decay. The hearing was conducted at the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) Joint Meeting of the Dental Products Panel of the Medical Devices Advisory Committee of the Center for Devices and Radiological Health and the Peripheral and Central Nervous System Drugs Advisory Committee of the Center for Drug Evaluation and Research. "While much of the testimony and literature is usually focused on the scientific aspects of the safety of dental amalgam, in the end, it all comes down to two people - the practicing dentist and the patient, who places his or her trust in their dentist," testified Dr. Mayher.

The hearing was preceded by the FDA's conclusion, after reviewing 34 research studies, that there has been no significant new information that would change its determination that mercury-based fillings do not harm patients, except in the rare case of an allergic reaction. Numerous other witnesses at the hearing agreed with the FDA's conclusion.

Dr. Mayher stressed that credible institutions and federal agencies have "validated the safety of dental amalgam, time and time again, aided by many years of research." He added that, "I have placed amalgams in my immediate family members' mouths in the past, and I would not hesitate to do so in the future."

Amalgam is safe to use and performs better than any other restorative material when placed in a moist environment. Further, many alternative treatments, such as crown and bridge work or gold onlays, are prohibitively more expensive and may not be an option for some patients. Therefore, using this restorative material is a matter of choice for the consumer - the patient.

"Until such time as amalgam, or any other restorative material previously approved for use in this country, is determined by credible sources to have detrimental effects on a patient's health, and on society, the decision whether or not to place this material should be made by educated consumers under the guidance of his or her dentist," concluded Dr. Mayher.

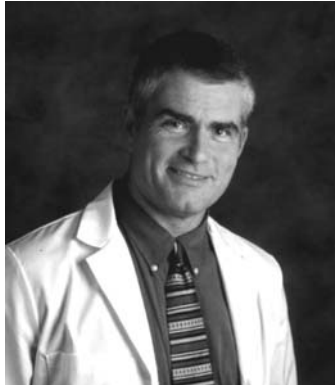

Report - Maryland State Board of Dental Examiners

Open State Board Meeting June 7, 2006

After 25 years as your liaison to the State Board of Dental Examiners, I witnessed an historical moment at the Board's Open Meeting June 7, 2006.

The Board members as well as their counsel, were about to be taken to task by three African-American delegates from the Maryland State Legislature because of repeated complaints about harsh and terrorizing treatment to African-American Dental licensees from their respective districts, who had violated the Dental Practice Act.

In particular, Delegate Shirley Nathan-Pullen, herself a registered nurse, could not believe how severe and disproportionate the penalties of the Board were for non-life-threatening offenses, resulting in both demoralizing and financial ruin for the convicted Dentists, as well as denial of reimbursement by Insurance Companies due to widespread publicity of their names and offenses.

She threatened the Board, who has absolute power and answers to no one, with revisiting the sunset law, involving the NAACP, and presenting their complaints to the entire Maryland House of Delegates assembly. She exposed the forthcoming Fall 2006 Newsletter, of which she already had a copy, and asked the Board members if they were proud of their written information. Upon hearing a resounding "yes" from the Board, she retorted that if she were a prospective Dental student and she read this Newsletter, she would not touch Dentistry as a career with a 10 foot pole.

Committee Report September 11, 2006

The Board has successfully passed its sunset review evaluation by the Legislature and will be extended for another 5 years until its next review.

The Board will hopefully finish its anesthesia conclusions with the September 20, 2006 committee meeting.

The Board's Fall newsletter will be coming out shortly.

On June 7, 2006, a meeting between representatives of the Maryland Department of Health & Mental Hygiene, the Maryland State Board of Dental Examiners and the Maryland Institute for Medical Emergency Systems met to discuss the role of Dental Professionals in the event of a catastrophic disaster.

Montgomery Voluntary Dental Clinic is closed effective June 30, 2006 and will no longer receive pro bono Dental professionals or anonymous donations.

Dental Assisting National Board (DANB) has developed a career ladder template for Dental Assistants.

There are specific formula for calculations and credits, but a combination of continuing education plus service to the community is the requirement for the recognition available to all Masters.

Legislative Committee Report

The following is the status of open regulations before the Board:

COMAR 10.44.01 Dental Assistants: The proposal allows a dental assistant, under the general supervision of a dentist, to assist a dental hygienist while the dental hygienist is applying a sealant in a dental facility under a dental sealant program. The proposal was forwarded to the Office of Regulations Coordination on June 21, 2006.

COMAR 10.44.12 General Anesthesia: H.B. 558, State Board of Dental Examiners - Regulation of Sedation - Issuance of Permits, was signed into law on May 11, 2004 as Chapter 357, Acts of 2004. The bill provides, inter alia that the Board develop and draft regulations concerning the administration of sedation. There are 9 members of the Sedation Committee including its Chair, Dr. W. King Smith. The Committee first met on October 20, 2004. The Committee has since met on December 15, 2004, January 25, 2005, February 16, 2005, April 6, 2005, and May 18, 2005. A Public Hearing was held on June 30, 2005 at the offices of the Board. The Sedation Committee met again on September 7, 2005, November 2, 2005, December 7, 2005, January 18, 2006, March 1, 2006, and April 5, 2006. A second public meeting was held on June 21, 2006 at 6:00 PM.

COMAR 10.44.20 Fees: The proposal establishes a Dental Board application fee of \$25 for dentists licensed in a state other than Maryland who wish to participate in an advanced clinical training program for continuing education at the University of Maryland Dental School. The proposal has been forwarded to the Officer of Regulations Coordination. Related to COMAR 10.44.22 Continuing Education.

COMAR 10.44.20 Fees: The proposal codifies the amendment to Health Occupations Article, § 4-307 (c), Annotated Code of Maryland, Chapter 469, Laws of 2006 which deletes the \$5 fee the Board may charge to replace a lost or destroyed license, and instead permits the Board by regulation to impose a fee that approximates the actual cost of replacing the license. The proposal was forwarded to the Office of Regulations Coordination on June 16, 2006.

COMAR 10.44.22 Continuing Education: The proposal provides that a dentist who holds a dental license in another state but who is not licensed in Maryland, may participate in an advanced clinical training program of continuing education at the University of Maryland Dental School after application to and approval from the Board. The Board voted to approve on February 1, 2006. The proposal has been forwarded to the Office of Regulations Coordination. Related to COMAR 10.44.20 Fees.

OVEN-ROASTED VEGETABLES MAY BE BAD FOR TEETH

The current fashion for oven-roasted vegetables might be healthy for your body but could be bad for your teeth, a new study claimed.

Different methods of cooking vegetables could vary their effects on dental erosion, a study by researchers at the University of Dundee has found.

A research team led by Dr. Graham Chadwick in the School of Dentistry have investigated whether the method of cooking a popular vegetarian dish, Ratatouille, would have any impact on the acidity of the food, and therefore the potential for contributing to dental erosion.

Their research found that, however it is cooked, ratatouille is acidic. But, oven-roasting significantly increases the acidity compared to the more traditional stewed version of the dish, to the point where it is as acidic as some carbonated drinks.

Dr. Chadwick said, "The acidity of ratatouille prepared by oven-roasting is the same as that of some carbonated drinks that, when

consumed in excess, are believed to contribute to the development of dental erosion."

"The finding that cooking method has an impact on the acidity of food is an interesting and useful tool for dentists when advising patients on ways to reduce their chances of dental erosion."

The Dundee team's research was based on reports that people on a vegetarian diet may be more at risk from dental erosion because such a large quantity of the foods they eat, such as fruits and vegetables, tend to be quite acidic in nature.

Dental erosion is caused by the direct contact of acid with the teeth. The acid destroys tooth tissues and can result in severe destruction, leading to the need for expensive and time-consuming dental treatment.

The Dundee team also investigated whether the cooking method had an impact on the acidities of individual vegetables and fruits. They found the cooking method had no impact on the acidity of tomatoes or onions, but roasting resulted in more acidic green

peppers and other vegetables. Red peppers were more acidic when stewed.

The research is published in the current edition of the European Journal of Prosthodontics and Restorative Dentistry. It is one in a series of research projects being carried out at the university looking into the causes of dental erosion.

These findings came as another study suggested that tooth erosion, caused by acidic food, was becoming as big a threat to dental health as tooth decay caused by sugar.

The second study, by GlaxoSmithKline Consumer Healthcare (GSK), claimed that teeth were under threat from the acid contained in modern diets.

They reported that acid erosion-a condition that can affect all ages-was a growing issue for dental care in the 21st century.

In October 2005, 91 percent of UK dentists reported seeing cases of acid erosion on a weekly basis. Foods and drinks in the modern diet that are a risk include fruit tea, balsamic vinegar, wine and some fruits.

Dr. Martin Trope from the Department of Endodontics, UNC School of Dentistry and Dr. Ben Johnson, founder of Tulsa Endodontic, and developer of Thermafill presented an all day seminar on new endodontic techniques. Well over 100 dentists and staff attended the April 7, 2006 meeting at Martin's Crosswinds

in Greenbelt Maryland.

The William Thomas Green Morton Award was presented to Dr. Rafael Bowen, DDS at the Maryland AGD annual meeting. The "Morty" has been awarded annually since 1997 to such deserving individuals as Drs. Slavkin, Dr. Paul Keyes, and Hal Donnell the past Executive Director of the National AGD. Dr. Bowen, a distinguished scientist, developed composite resin and tech-

niques of bonding changed is regarded as a major advance in materials and practical applications for the patients. He is also credited with developing adhesives for bonding to dentin and enamel, pit and fissure sealants, and orthodontic bracket resins.

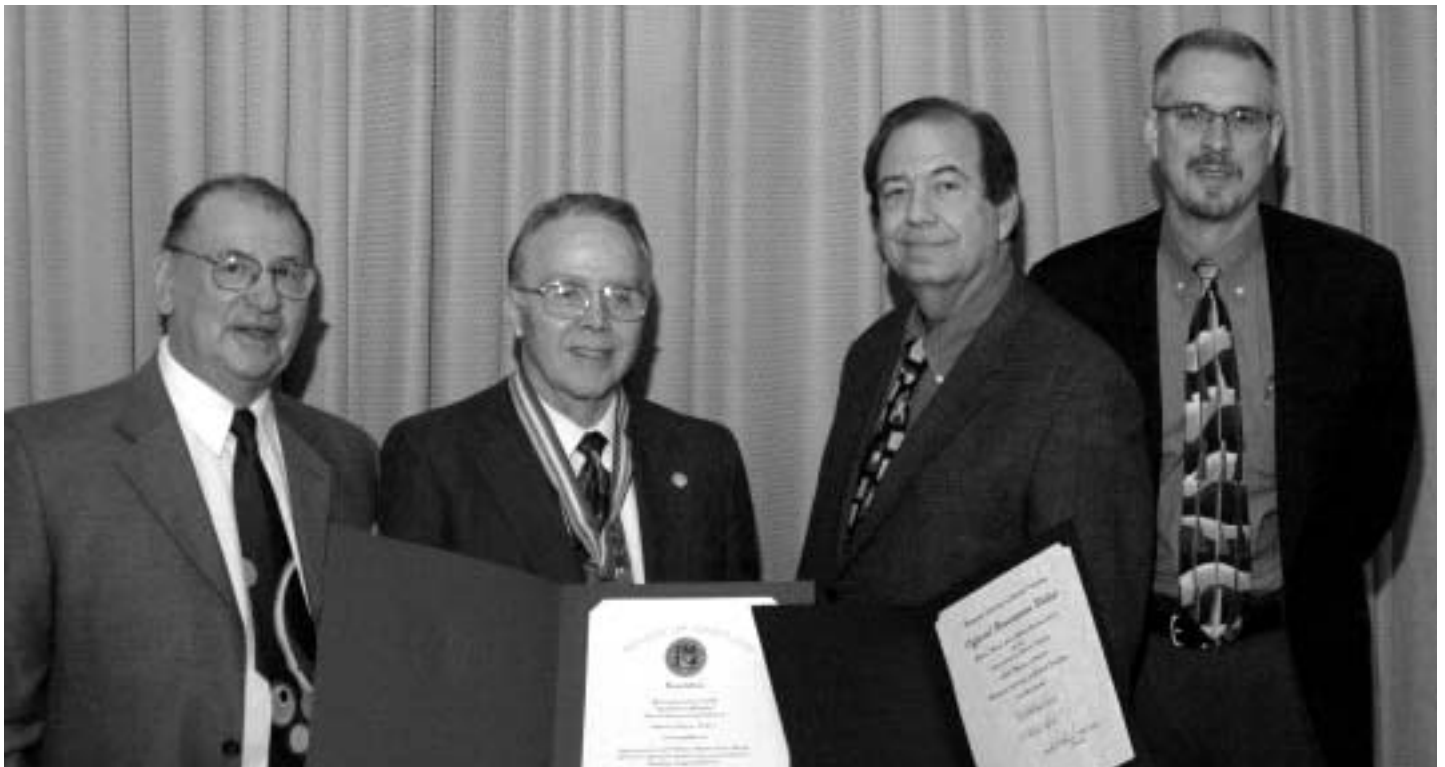

WHAT EXACTLY IS BRUXISM?



Bruxism is the technical term for teeth grinding and clenching that causes facial pain. People unintentionally bite down too hard at inappropriate times, such as in their sleep. In addition these bruxers may also bite their fingernails, pencils and chew the inside of their cheek. People usually aren't diagnosed with bruxism until it is too late because so many people don't realize they have the habit. Others mistakenly believe that their teeth must touch at all times.

Who suffers from bruxism?

Bruxism is triggered by people with certain types of personalities. They may have a nervous tension and a hard time handling stress. Anger, pain and frustration can cause people to start showing the beginning signs of bruxism without them even knowing it. People who are aggressive, competitive and hurried also may be at a greater risk for bruxism.

What are the signs of bruxism?

- ✓ Tips of the teeth look flat
- ✓ Extreme sensitivity due to the inside of the tooth (dentin) being exposed from grinding
- ✓ Jaw pain due to popping and clicking of the temporomandibular joint (TMJ)
- ✓ Tongue indentations



What can be done?

Your general dentist automatically checks for physical signs of bruxism and if it seems to be present the condition may be observed over several visits before recommending and starting therapy. The objective of therapy is to get the bruxer to change behavior by learning how to rest the tongue, teeth and lips properly. While simply becoming aware of the problem and changing their behavior may be enough for some people, others will have to wear a plastic mouth appliance, such as a night guard that's worn to absorb the force of biting. This appliance can prevent future damage to the teeth and helps change the patient's destructive behavior. Biofeedback is used on daytime grinders by using electronic instruments to measure muscle activity and to teach patients how to reduce muscle activity when the biting force becomes too great. Researchers are still experimenting with new ways to help those who tend to clench in their sleep.
